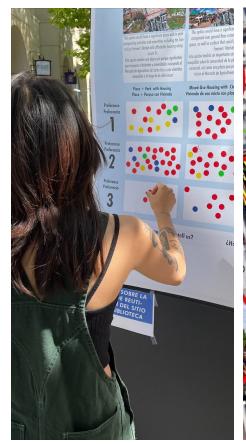

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1. INTRODUCTION

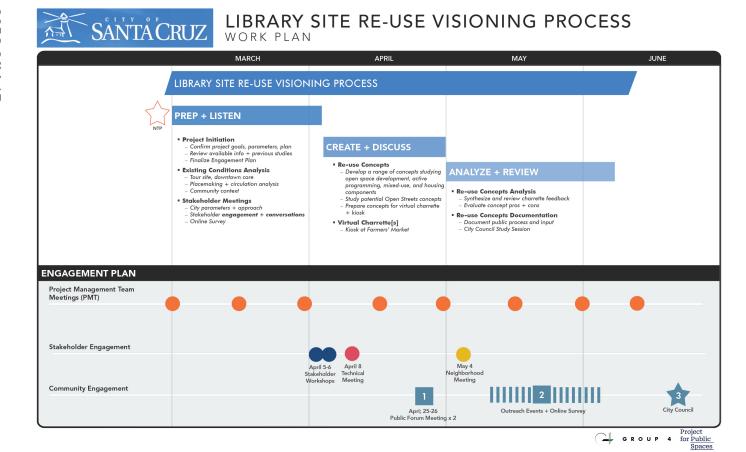
1.1 PROJECT INTRODUCTION

On June 23rd, 2020, the Santa Cruz City Council voted to move forward with the Library Mixed Use project, which will re-locate the Downtown Library to the intersection of Cedar and Lincoln Streets as part of a mixed-use and affordable housing development. The purpose of the Santa Cruz Library Site Re-Use Visioning process is to create an implementable, community-oriented vision for the existing Downtown Library site once the Library has moved to its new location. The recommended vision in the report is based on an extensive public and stakeholder engagement process, as well as a thorough understanding of the site and the community.

Several potential public uses and components were considered and discussed for this site, including parks, plazas, the farmers' market, parking, and mixed-use and affordable housing. At this time, there is no funding identified for the implementation of the preferred vision.

1.2 PROJECT CONTEXT

The current downtown library site is in the heart of downtown Santa Cruz, located across from City Hall and in close proximity to the Civic Auditorium. The approximately 59,000 square foot site is bounded by Locust Street and Church Street to its North and South, and Cedar Street and Center Street on the East and West respectively. The site includes the existing downtown Library, and two associated public parking lots – Lot 14 and Lot 16, which have a total of 59 parking spaces.



2. PROCESS

2.1 SCHEDULE

The Santa Cruz Library Site Re-Use Visioning process began in March 2021 and concluded in June 2021 with the submission of this report and a City Council study session.

2.1.2 PUBLIC OUTREACH AND INPUT

The first round of public outreach included two identical online workshops, one held on a weekday evening and another on a weekend afternoon. This outreach and engagement was developed within Project for Public Space's "Placemaking" framework, which focused on creating a discussion about potential uses and characteristics of the site based on the following principles:

- Mixture of Uses: Create a dynamic, mixed-use civic center in downtown Santa Cruz that offers a new type of destination. Incorporate housing and also feature a mixture of community, civic, and market amenities.
- Inviting and Intergenerational: Have the space be inviting to everyone in Santa Cruz, not just residents. Include age-friendly attractions and opportunities to draw-in visitors for arts, culture, markets, and community experiences.
- Flexible Design: Design the public space with an openness and flexibility that can accommodate programming and activities that can change with the time of day, week, and year.
- Pedestrian and Transit Connectivity: Provide pedestrian and transit friendly street features that allow people to access the other great destinations in downtown Santa Cruz safely and with ease.

Potential project components, described in section 3, were also presented and ideas and themes for potential uses for this site were discussed. Participants gathered in small break out groups to maximize opportunity for everyone to share their thoughts. Participant comments were jotted down on a shared screen. Participants were encouraged to share additional comments on Zoom chat or on the City's project web page. Comments received during this period are included in the appendix. See Appendix for the presentation.

Input gathered from the community workshops was used to shape the community survey for the second round of public input. This survey was available in English and Spanish. It was published online and was also administered in-person at four locations across the City. These locations included the Pacific Avenue Retail Corridor, the Midtown Market, the Beach Flats and Nueva Vista Community Center. In addition to the City's publishing efforts, the online survey was also shared by local organizations with community members. These organizations include:

3. PROJECT COMPONENTS

The options presented to the community for consideration included various components and uses that could potentially be included on this site.

3.1 PLAZA

Plazas are vibrant features of many downtowns, serving as outdoor gathering spaces that support a great variety of activities. A plaza can support community members and businesses, while complementing the City Hall and Auditorium. From an expanded corner or a widened street edge to a larger programmable space, this site can support a plaza of any size.

3.2 PARK

Parks can have a variety of landscape and hardscape features, interactive spaces and activities. With new residential and commercial developments downtown, a park could support individuals and families that live and work downtown.

3.3 FARMERS' MARKET

The Santa Cruz Farmers' Market, currently operating on Parking Lot 4, takes place once a week on Wednesdays and anticipates operating two times a week in the future. The City is aiding the Market's effort to find a permanent space and it was discussed as a potential component for this site. The Farmers' Market is not only a source of produce, but also acts as an important incubator for local businesses. The Farmers' Market could be integrated with a park and plaza.

3.4 HOUSING

Affordable Housing is a priority for Downtown Santa Cruz. A significant amount of housing is currently being developed downtown, but only a limited amount of it is affordable. The City's Housing blueprint encourages staff to maximize affordability in downtown housing units and analyze parcels that are best suited for affordable housing development, with particular attention to existing surface parking lots. The site could support a variety of housing types, from townhomes to apartments, and can go up to three stories or higher with the Council's approval.

3.5 STREETSCAPE

As opportunities on the site were being considered, the important role adjacent sidewalks and streets play in creating a vibrant public space was also discussed.

3.6 CULTURE, ART AND IDENTITY

Located within the Cedar Street Village Corridor, which strives to preserve and enhance the informal village qualities of Cedar Street, the site has the potential to reflect Santa Cruz's unique culture, artwork and identity. Murals or sculptural elements could be incorporated into the site to reflect community expression, complementing the civic character of City Hall and the Civic Auditorium.

3.7 PARKING

This visioning process aims to reconfigure and retain the existing number of parking spaces on this site.



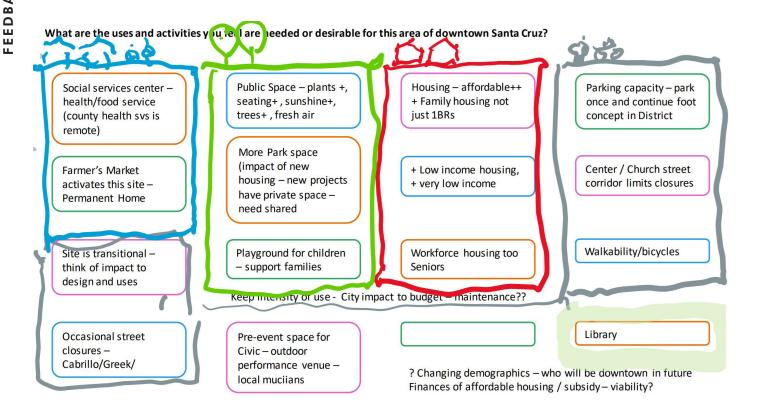

4. SUMMARY OF COMMUNITY AND STAKEHOLDER FEEDBACK

4.1 ROUND 1: SUMMARY OF INPUT FROM STAKEHOLDER AND COMMUNITY WORKSHOPS

A few key themes emerged from stakeholder, staff and community workshops.

- Flexible design and a mixture of uses were the priorities for this site.
- Housing advocates and employees that work downtown see an important opportunity to dedicate a significant portion of this site to affordable, low-income, and rent restricted housing. Workforce housing was also a preferred option.
- The Santa Cruz Farmers' Market expressed interest in moving to this site, and community members expressed support for their presence.
- To retain the character of the site community members also saw the potential to adaptively re-use the
 existing library structure for community or retail uses such as food halls, museums, community centers
 etc.
- Downtown residents, shoppers, business owners and associated local organizations brought to light the need for more flexible open spaces that are family friendly. Places to eat, picnic and gather, and spaces for children to play were among some of the popular themes that emerged for open spaces. Participants in these workshops expressed a strong desire to see more spaces like Abbott Square in Downtown Santa Cruz. However, there were also concerns about the safety and management of open spaces on this site.
- Participants expressed the desire to retain the scale and character of downtown Santa Cruz, with pedestrian friendly spaces. The Church Street festival and the Greek Festival were cited as successful examples of using adjacent streets as public spaces. Based on access needs of neighboring properties,

and emergency access requirements of the Fire Department, partial closure of the western half of Church Street for use by the Farmers' Market is feasible.

- Users and advocates of the Civic Auditorium saw the opportunity to use open space on this site for performance-related activities such as rehearsals and large events.
- Advocates of the downtown Library expressed their desire to keep the library on site.

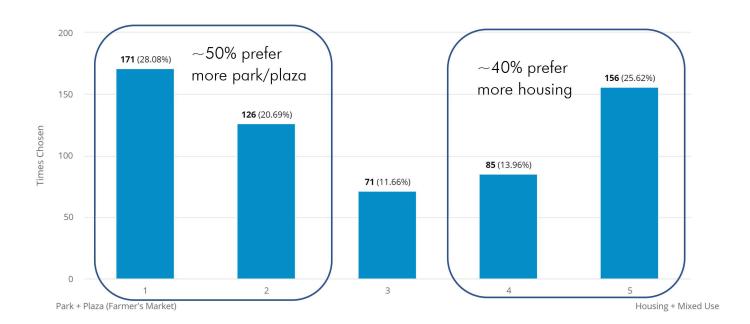
4.2 ROUND 2: SUMMARY OF FINDINGS FROM COMMUNITY SURVEY

Input from stakeholder and community workshops was synthesized into a community survey that could further narrow down the possibilities and help build consensus for a joint vision for the site. The survey was divided into two parts. The first section of the survey was aimed at understanding the community's priorities through indication of the level of preference between various pairs of individual uses and characteristics of the site. The second section of the survey showed three possible vision alternatives with different scales of potential uses on the site.

4.2.1 USES

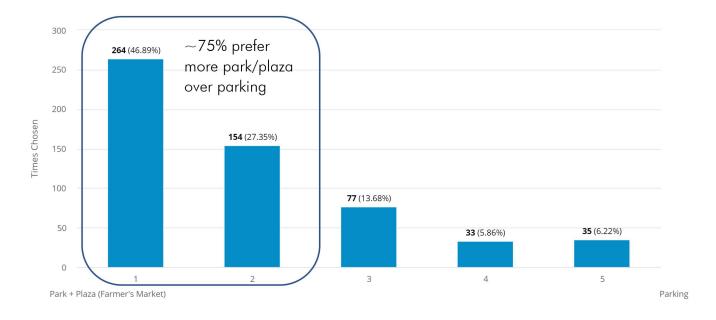
Park + Plaza (Farmers' Market) vs. Housing + Mixed Use

A slim preference for more open space was seen when participants were given the opportunity to indicate their preference for more housing versus more park or plaza space on this site. Throughout this survey, no distinction was made between park and plaza spaces. Almost 40% respondents indicated a preference for more housing on the site while almost 50% indicated a preference for more park and/ or plaza space on this site, which would include the Farmers' Market. Approximately 11% indicated that they would prefer a balance of housing and open space on the site.



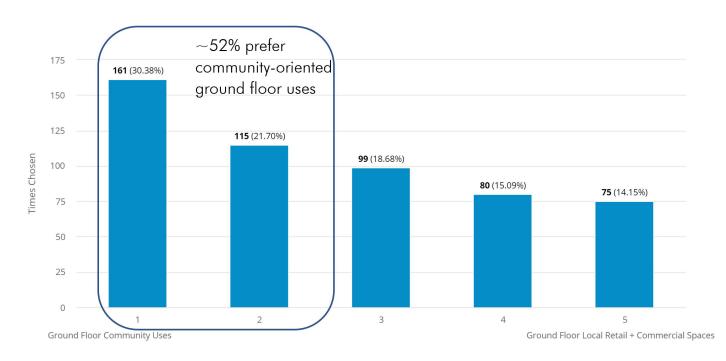
Park + Plaza (Farmers' Market) vs. Parking

The preference for more park and/or plaza space was significant when compared with parking. Only 12% preferred more parking over more park and plaza space. An additional 13% indicated that they would prefer a balance of parking and park and/or plaza space. Almost 75% indicated that they would like to see more park and/or plaza space, including the farmers' market, over parking space.



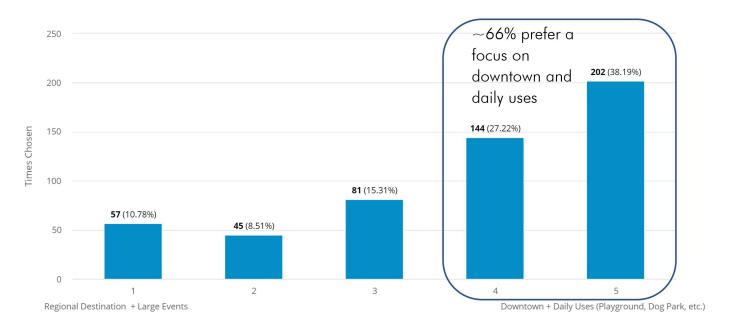
Ground Floor Community Uses vs. Ground Floor Retail + Commercial Spaces.

A preference for ground floor community uses over ground floor retail uses was apparent, with over 52% respondents supporting the preference.



Regional Destination + Large Events vs. Downtown + Daily Uses

Echoing input during in Round 1 of stakeholder and community workshops, a significantly larger number of respondents, approximately 66% indicated a preference for a vision that was more focused on downtown and daily uses, such as parks and playgrounds, versus a vision that was more focused toward regional use and large events. Only 20% indicated a preference for a regional destination and large event space.



4.2.2 VISION ALTERNATIVES

Part 2 of the survey asked participants to rank in order of preference three different alternative site use concepts. Each had a simple title, a short description and a site plan illustration. As quantitative site capacity or technical feasibility of options was beyond the scope of this visioning study, the sketch site illustrations were kept purposely loose and were prepared just as a communication aide. These are outlined on the following pages.

Plaza + Park with Housing

This option would have a significant plaza and/or park incorporating activities and amenities including the Santa Cruz Farmers' Market with affordable housing along Locust St.



Mixed-Use Housing with Civic Plaza

This option would have a significant affordable housing component over ground floor community or commercial space, as well as a plaza that could potentially include the Santa Cruz Farmers' Market.



Library Structure Re-purpposed with Parking

This option would adaptively re-use the existing building frame for community or commercial space with an adjacent, reconfigured mid-block parking lot.



Rank Order of Preference. Approximately 550 participants ranked the options which provided very clear preferences. The "Mixed-Use Housing with Civic Plaza", which had a significant housing component with a smaller park and plaza space received the highest score, with the greatest number of respondents ranking it first. The "Plaza + Park" with housing received the greatest number of 2nd choice responses, giving it the second rank. The "Library Structure Re-purposed with Parking" option, which proposes to adaptively re-use the library structure for community or commercial uses, received the lowest score, and ranked lowest amongst the three options.

^{*}The scoring is based on the ranked question above. The question had 3 choices, so when an item was ranked number one, it got a score of 3, second position got a score of 2, and the third position gets the lowest score of 1. The total score of each choice was calculated based on these weighted values, for however many times it was ranked.

Interest in keeping the library on the site. As Council specifically requested this vision process to address how the site be repurposed after the library is relocated, the survey did not include questions about the relocated library project. Nevertheless, we created space in all of the engagements and at the end of the survey for people to share whatever was on their minds. Amongst a wide range of comments that are included in the appendix, approximately 17% of respondents expressed their desire to have the library remain on site. At the in-person kiosk it was interesting to see different members of a couple or family consider these questions in each their own way, and prioritize or comment differently. A word cloud of the topics addressed in the comments with font size reflecting frequency of use of that word within the comments given is shown below.

5. SITE RE-USE VISION RECOMMENDATION

Site reuse processes often take many years of consideration and analysis. While this was the City's first structured dialogue regarding the existing Library site, there was a high level of community interest and engagement with the visioning process. Based on the responses received, there is a strong preference for a significant portion of the site to incorporate affordable housing. Complementing this community goal, there is strong interest in downtown-focused open space that could include a combination of plaza and park spaces supporting the Farmers' Market. Ground floor uses in a potential multi-story housing component should also be focused on community needs, as opposed to commercial development.

"Affordable Housing is a priority for our community. I believe it can be done in a mixed-use format with an acknowledgement of place, respect and voice of the people served, housing elements guidelines, creative and cultural appropriate design and environmental sustainability."

6. NEXT STEPS

Typically, a site feasibility study will follow the visioning process, and include a greater level of detail regarding site reuse, capacity, and economics. This particular site's reuse would benefit from a feasibility study that provides more information on the following questions:

Affordable Housing Analysis:

- Within the context of downtown and specifically this site, what is the right type of affordable housing? Family, senior, workforce, etc.
- What are the appropriate affordability targets?
- What are the development economics and what opportunities are there for needed funding?
- What types of housing structure(s) provide for the preferred (townhouse, multi-story wood frame, podium, etc.)? How many stories?

Park and Plaza

- What uses are most desired?
- What hardscape and landscape and site furniture features are most desired
- What are the costs of construction, maintenance, and programming, and how will they be funded?
- What Further analysis of partial/temporary street closures to facilitate farmers market?

"I would love more options for downtown to feel like a destination for families, where you can bring children. A cute playground. A park with a nice grassy patch. This way you can shop, eat and find a spot to hang out with your kids. It would also be great to have nicer public restroom options for this same reason."

7.1.2 STAKEHOLDER MEETING SUMMARY

Highlights from the Stakeholder Meetings:

- The Santa Cruz Farmers Market leadership would like to have a permanent space a space that is architecturally and aesthetically comfortable, and expands programming/offerings (cold storage, interior space, etc.). They have worked with the City to explore options on Lot 7 on Front Street and are particularly interested in this location. There is a possibility of the farmers market happening more than once a week in the future. A larger market in summer and smaller one in winter. They would also like to have a covered area
- The Church St fair and Greek festival were popular examples in discussions with stakeholders of events or markets temporarily using streets
- Given the assumption that the Library is moving, affordable housing is the best use for this site. There are
 very few lots left in Downtown Santa Cruz and Housing is a critical need there. This site would be good
 for low-income, rent-restricted, housing.
- The site could complement and augment the civic auditorium events, pre-function gathering, rehearsals, lectures and more.
- The Farmers Market and the Civic both are regional draws and recognize the need for parking for their patrons.
- Further discussion will be needed about the operation, maintenance and management of parks and plazas on this site.
- Advocates believe that the library is still the best use for this site.

7.2 CITY STAFF MEETING SUMMARY

Downtown Library Site Re-Use Visioning Process

April 8th - Technical Meeting

Attendees: City Staff from Public Works, Parks & Recreation, Planning, Fire, and the City Manager's Office.

Department Feedback:

- Planning: Max height on the site is 35ft, but could go up to 50ft on parts of the site with City
 Council approval
- Fire Department: important to maintain access for Fire Trucks. Center Street is a key transit corridor and would be problematic to close on a regular basis. Church Street and Locust Street would be better for potential closures.
- City Manager's Office Sustainability: consider a solar canopy. With proximity to other City owned sites might be opportunity to take advantage of net energy metering
- Parks & Recreation Civic Auditorium: Parking and access to auditorium are important

7.3 NEIGHBORHOOD STAKEHOLDER MEETING SUMMARY

May 4th – Meeting with Church Street Businesses

Attendees: Representatives from Birichino, Cruzio, Ecology Action, & Prophet Elias Greek Orthodox Church.

- Keep in mind line of sight for infrastructure on roof of Cruzio building

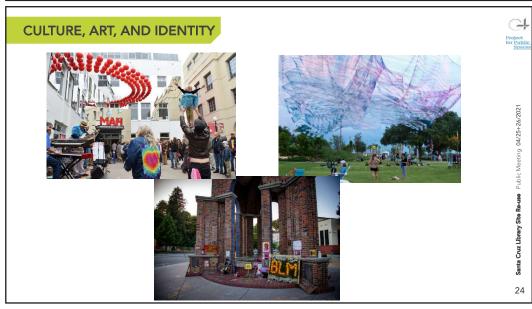


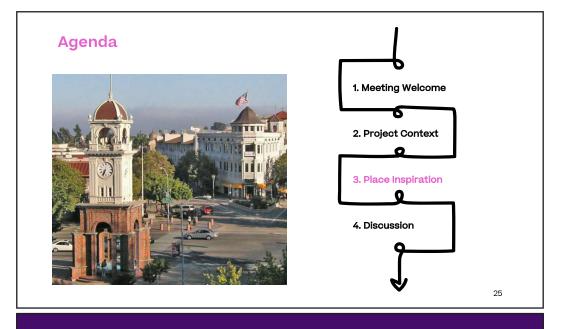






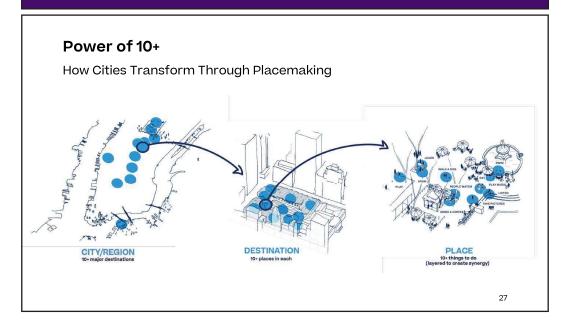


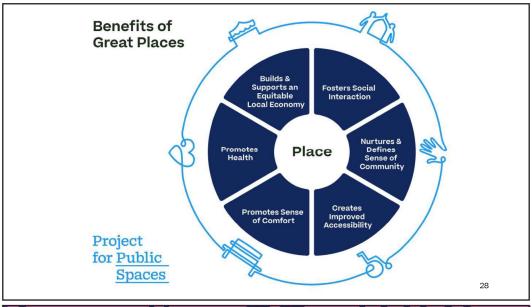




What is Placemaking?

Placemaking is a collaborative process that brings people together to create the great public spaces at the heart of their communities.







Promote a mix of uses

This Community needs functional community meeting space that includes flexibility to adapt to different meeting and gathering formats. The space needs to have up to date catering facilities along with audiovisual technology needed to support community engagement and outreach activities.

I don't understand the project really. I do like the idea of the area being used for a wider range of things and I don't really care what, apart from the fact that I do want lose this Library location.

I support updating the library and moving it out of its current site which has many structural problems. I also support developing the Farmers Market Parking lot into mixed use with a more permanent spot for the farmers market

I dont think the current farmers market space should be turned into a library....rebuild the library on its current site and add affordable housing!

I am so glad that this site can be re-used for another purpose. Parking is the killer! So expensive! We should be bold and build affordable housing with zero parking. The Downtown is already protected by a strong parking

It's hard to get excited for anything new when we are incapable of effectively running what we currently have.

Santa cruz library site re-use visioning process

Please use measure S funds to rebuild the library on it's existing site. It is central to the civic center and has enjoyed that location for over 100 years. Lot 4 should be a permanent home to the Farmer's Market. There is no need to build a massive parking structure and move the library. If you go to Lot 4 any time of day or night, there are many unused parking spaces. Workers and visitors to downtown need transit options, not more automobile infrastructure

It would be great to have some green spaces downtown.

This is a great opportunity to create the largest public gather space downtown to house many events.

Instead of just Affordable Housing the focus should also be on Low Income Housing. Many people in SC are living on poverty wages and need housing more affordable than the "Affordable" designation. Thank you.

I believe an area with more restaurants and outdoor dining would be a great addition to downtown. COVID has led more restaurants to open outdoor dining on the street, but it would be great to have an area that was designed for outdoor use. Abbott Square has been a great example of how desirable an outdoor dining and gathering place is downtown, as has the success of the makeshift outdoor dining spaces restaurants have experimented with over the past several months.

Another option would be to close Pacific avenue to vehicles to create more outdoor dining and gathering space, and using former library location for more housing/repurposing the building. Repurposing the existing building does seem like the most cost effective option and could be very cool if completed as depicted in the image.

Downtown needs a nice open park!

Affordable housing is critical.

Single level street parking lots are a waste of downtown real-estate.

While I really like the community center idea, I know I am less likely to use the community center or a plaza unless downtown no longer is the hub and central activity for our homeless population. Because the community spaces have become more dominated by the homeless population, it is less of a space I feel like I can enjoy. That is part of the reason why I voted first for repurposing the current library building. As much as I want the community center 1) the atmosphere downtown would prevent me from utilizing it 2) our money can be spent on solving larger issues than making a pretty place that won't get as much use. Let's take care of the big things first, then we can get into the details of making Santa Cruz better.

I think it's important to include affordable housing and public open space. Thank you!

I would like something done about the rampant drug culture in Santa Cruz.

As a parent, I'm especially sick of the whole "Keep Santa Cruz Weird" nonsense and would like to see a movement toward civility, safe family-friendly access to shopping, theaters and all the amenities that make a downtown great.

Mental illness, homelessness, discarded needles and human feces keep us from feeling safe allowing our teens

to explore their own beaches, and local community. The police do their best, but we really need to take back our community in order to keep businesses flourishing and give our families a place to be families.

I would love more options for downtown to feel like a destination for families, where you can bring children. A cute playground. A park with a nice grassy patch. This way you can shop, eat and find a spot to hang out with your kids. It would also be great to have nicer public restroom options for this same reason.

Pretty weak survey when all the options sound the same. Can't even imagine the costs to build housing making financial sense. Why downtown? Do it some place else. We need parking.

We need more very low income housing to reach our state goals.

Affordable housing and a library is the most needed options.

Affordable housing is our greatest, most important need and should be prioritized.

You need to quit doing and asking the same questions over and over. A decision has been made twice on the mult-use new library/affordable housing/parking structure. It's time to follow through and get on with it!

I think it would be very useful to include City offices on the ground floor of the mixed use housing. That would strengthen the civic character of Center Street; and connect both sides of the street with public services.

Housing, housing, housing for the homeless, for low-income.

First, central-downtown is not the place to put more housing, whether mixed use or low-income; we do not need more cars and people congesting the area, and this congestion will be significantly worse if Church street gets blocked off. Second, any new parking structure designs should be primarily underground, especially in the case of parking for housing. Third, whatever option is chosen, put more bathrooms than the planners deem necessary; have them for men, women, and gender non-comforming/non-binary people. Lastly, re-using the library building is the best idea and should be the only one considered. This town is so annoying with how it pays developers for unnecessary projects that the community ends up disliking, and there's already a perfectly good building with a perfectly good and lucrative option for the city to put it to use, with minimal disturbance to the downtown area. There's no reason it shouldn't be utilized. If the itch to tear it down and create housing is still present in 10 years, then it can be reconsidered for housing. Right now, we should just do what we can to use the already-existing materials to their fullest extent. Don't be wasteful of time, community money, and resources.

Affordable housing with services for seniors please

I have talked to many people who would be interested in building an Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs), both in the incorporated and especially in the unincorporated part of the county. This would help with housing in Santa Cruz county. The problem is the County has made it nearly impossible to do, both from over burdensome regulations and more importantly the costs of fees and permits to do so.

The county should make an effort to reduce both of those burdens, as well as provide assistance in the form of mixed grants and financing so that ADU's could be built.

Big Yes to apartments for Low income people—-families and singles.

Maximize affordable housing with the lowest qualifying level. We DO need some parking as well.

Lowest possible income 100% affordable housing is the highest priority. We need housing for low-income workers who can afford to both live and work downtown.

New library is VERY important to our communities Affordable housing is a must!

Keep it as our library - keep it as is! That's what we voted for when we gave you money to refurbish it - keep the library where it is!

I don't agree with any of the survey statements, but to get to this point you made me answer them - so sneaky and underhanded!! The whole process of moving the library has been sneaky and underhanded.

Unclear to me whether library is included in these three options. I still want a downtown library in this location. NOT another commercial development.

Options not clearly presented so results may not be truly relevant.

Don't build large parking structure

Work towards less cars and more walking and biking downtown

I think affordable housing should be the top priority. Many people struggle to afford to live here on wages they make, and having more affordable housing would be good for the community as a whole. Also I think a better place for a farmers market would be to once a week shut Pacific Avenue down and have the farmers market and other vendors, there, just like San Luis Obispo does on Higuera St.

Affordable housing is badly needed, especially for seniors, single young adults, young families, and especially single moms. It would be great to see seniors and single moms live near each other, as some seniors enjoy kids and would love to help out in small ways. outside space to sit and a playground is a must, as is some parking, because public transport does not work for the disabled.

Keeping farmers market is the most important thing to me even though I'm a big library user. Rebuild the library where it is. Parking less important.

Nobody wants to see the library knocked down and having a park next to City hall is going to be a huge mistake of you didn't already realize.. currently the city of Santa Cruz is ruining the town.. figure it out

There are too many projects being purposed or approved that are over 4 stories high. The city of Santa Cruz needs to get creative with grants, money from the state or federal government to supplement developer's projects so very low-income and low-income housing can be built without adding a 5th or 6th or higher amount of floors. Hire a city manager who knows how to network. We have high earners in our city who should be contacted for their philanthropic solutions. Bring racial equity to the zoning across all of Santa Cruz. Keep Santa Cruz a place tourists will want to visit. Tourists are trying to get away from towns with 5 and 6 story buildings.

Seriously, the library should stay where it is unless voters tell you they want it to move. Put it up to a vote and you will know the truth.

Don't build the mixed use building on the current Farmers Market site! It isn't the right choice for Santa Cruz. These other options are poor second choices.

More information on each use would have allowed my selections to be more informed. As it was with so little information it felt each choice could be good or poor depending on how it was executed and what the space defaulted to homeless haven where no one else goes or an actual used space. Homeless haven was key reason I said no to a park

Thanks for trying to accommodate all the different points of view

I am strongly opposed to tearing down the very attractive ,existing library building. It should be re-purposed into a community center. Louden Nelson Center is totally used and we need more space like that for the citizens of Santa Cruz. Nothing on this site should be for out-of-towners.

If I had known when I voted for the library funds that they would be used for a parking structure/lirbrary/housing development, I would not have voted for them. The library in a parking structure is a huge disappointment to me. But I guess now I will just make the best of it. And I will be more careful in reading measures before I vote for them in the future.

Keep the Library where it is. Renovate the existing structure. Forget about increasing parking. Create a plaza/park and farmer's market where it is currently. Maintain a strict height limit downtown.

Given that the city is already struggling to fill existing commercial space with the pop-up program, additional commercial space is probably not a good idea. Additional parking is also probably not something to shoot for, if

we want to focus more on walkable and public transit options.

We desperately need affordable housing to make our community inclusive, interesting, and vibrant!

We don't need housing that will be disguised as "affordable" when it really won't be. The voters voted this down. CC should listen to ALL the voters.

This will not make SC look "Santa Cruzy". It will make us look like every other city that succumbed to big development dollars. We already have downtown community spaces for music, gathering and outdoor sports. We need to use what we have and not waste tax dollars on things the voters voted down.

My preference would be to keep the building height below 4 stories. Los Gatos (for example) has kept public parking lots away from the downtown area, rather than in the middle of it.

Items 1 and 2 of the options provided are basically the same just have parking area undefined vs defined. In general I do not feel that this survey is very well designed . It seems designed to lead to some preferential conclusion by planners. Surely there must be other activities this large prime location could support. Does the City of Santa Cruz really need to spend money on more parking spaces? Instead of encouraging people to drive, put that money towards public transit.

Housing of any kind on this property is not sane. First it belongs to the City of Santa Cruz and it should be standalone for the citizens. We need more social spaces in downtown. For example, Abbott Square is an example of a place where people can gather with their friends. However there should be more security at the new space to keep it safe and open to families. Abbot Square has retail, so perhaps a café and/or a place that sells snacks could be a nice addition...

Keep The existing library - like people overwhelmingly voted for when passing the last library tax measure which was supposed to be for improvements there!

I am a huge fan public libraries. It's discouraging that the building can't be used in some way; I wish it could have been improved like is happening with the smaller branches. With all the large development going on downtown, open green space is also important rather than just more concrete--parking lots/multi-story structures. Definitely want to see a place for the Farmer's market to continue - since it is only a few hours/once a week event, a way that space could be multi-purposed for other use outside of that time. Would love to see Civic Auditorium refurbished and be part of the plan for what happens contingent to the library parcel. Big changes altering the character of downtown. So much housing development already in the works - building for whom? seeing the prices skyrocket in our neighborhood with influx of tech professionals from the Bay area who want to live near the beach. What about the low-income Latino population who work in the restaurants, clean the hotels/buildings, landscapers - where are they going to live? How proximate will their housing be to the libraries. Housing affordability is a huge factor in our city. Glad the new library will have affordable housing component. I attended the downtown association presentation on new developments - comment made about parking that once people are living downtown they won't need cars - don't agree with that since we don't have a good public transportation infrastructure like other cities. It wasn't clear to me whether all the developments being built downtown will have adequate parking for residents. Made me wonder about 400 parking spaces in new library development and who will utilize those spaces. Our traffic is already so congested, we're just heading for further increases in that direction. Hoping all these plans and developments are being created in a cohesive way with an eye to what the future of our downtown and our city will be. Thank you for inviting input and your work on behalf of our community.

I stopped visiting downtown Santa Cruz and the library due to the homeless population. I don't know who will utilize the new library and don't support putting millions of dollars into it. Last time I was at the downtown library was years ago and a librarian was being loudly cussed out by a scuzzy man who was upset because the librarian evidently told him he couldn't view inappropriate material on the computers. Maybe there are filters today to restrict that now. I haven't been back since. Too many creepy incidents there including man urinating outside library in middle of day, weird man following me in library and running gauntlet of panhandling layabouts outside.

I just really hope the farmers market will have a nice permanent location no matter what option is picked.

A park in that space will only benefit the community if the public sense it is a safe and inviting space. Many other nearby parks have mentally ill people sleeping in them throughout the day. For instance, the park by the Mission typically has several of these folks at all times through the day which makes it an uninviting space for the public.

i've always liked the library just how it is. To make more opportunities downtown, build higher for everything, including *affordable* housing, parking, and office space. Seriously, downtown should be at least 5, probably 10 stories everywhere that isn't a cultural landmark, and as close to served exclusively by *quick, efficient* public transportation from remote parking as can be arranged. There is a lot of development south of Laurel that could be accomplished through buying out existing, *personally resident* owners, and buildings that are desperately in need of redevelopment anyway.

There does need to be parking somewhere but I favor a core downtown area that is car free, that makes for a very pleasant shopping experience and has made some downtowns so enjoyable!

The last question forces an answer against what we want, which is to upgrade/renovate current library with Measure S funds, and create a downtown commons / farmer's market on lot 4.

The library should stay where it is. No more parking!

Unless the housing is specifically earmarked for city employees who work downtown, I don't believe housing should be considered at this location. Housing yes—in one of the many many other sites, planned and potential, but let this space complete the Civic center, in the wY a library did—public spaces, civic activities, where residents can convene.

Very hard to really see the plans. Want everything to flow and not be separate components in one space. Is the parking fir housing or public parking.

I really like the idea of a market hall with leased vendor spaces. This reminds me of (1) the Santa Cruz County Fair vendors in large buildings at the fair grounds -- festive and fun, and (2) the tents that held downtown businesses after the 1989 earthquake. It also reminds me of the Original Farmer's Market in Los Angeles that I visited many times with my parents in the 1950s. A parking lot would be perfect for a farmer's market along with an adjoining market hall with indoor vendors and food courts. I do not want to see a public park because I worry that it would not be usable for the public and would become a homeless encampment area. The reused old library building and parking lot would be better for night time use than a park.

More apartments that people can afford. Create apartments that are 2-3 bedrooms for families. Have spaces where these occupants can use gym, pool etc. These occupants should have the same access to fun resources as other places do.

This is a sham. Voters like me approved funds for renovating the existing library, not for moving it or using the library as a cover to get passed a contentious parking addition.

Although you did not offer this as an option, I would like to see the current Library refreshed and brought up to code and the "NEW" Library project scrapped.

This should not be a public plaza. The building should be used to house city departments that are renting space in non-city owned buildings. A public plaza does not work in Santa Cruz unfortunately. It is difficult for the city to keep a semblance of behavioral standards or civility in our current public spaces, open spaces or parks. If the building is not used to get city departments out of rented offices, this needs to be developed with a low income housing developer or a private housing developer who can include a significant amount of subsidized housing (much more than 15% affordable units). This should not be public land unless the city plans on hiring security 24/7 or have it gated at night with security during the day.

A concern with parks and/or open spaces is that they don't become another homeless dump with garbage, needles and drug use.

More Parking

Please maximize affordable housing units at this site.

Repurpose the library the currently exists is really my only choice.

Any incorporation of a plaza or park will need safeguards against it becoming a homeless encampment/gathering place which would cause the housing to become unattractive very quickly

Looking forward to the project. I think along whit he other downtown projects for the lower Pacific St. area, it will help improve that area which has become very sketchy.

Links to City Hall and the other old outdated buildings in the area - change must happen and it starts with housing

I have always wondered why downtown SC didn't have more open space like a park or plaza. I would really like to see that!

I think it's important that when the city has land available to use it for affordable housing. I don't think more businesses and retail space will solve our problems and I think we need to shift away from cars and parking as our main form of transportation.

Is there anything wrong with just upgrading the existing facility and not having the expense of the additional items proposed?

I'd love to see the farmer's market have a new permanent home.

I was thinking a park would be nice but I think it would be overtaken by homeless folks so maybe that isn't a great idea.

Please do not devote this space to "affordable housing". Please consider the ENTIRE community and make it a space for all, not just a few who get housing through a lottery. This is a great opportunity for the city to have a destination plaza for ALL. Please don't squander it on housing for a FEW.

This survey is not a survey at all, but rather a manipulative guise to force the public to accept what is not wanted at all. I did not want to rank any of the preferred uses on page 3, but could not get to this page unless I ranked all three, and there is no option to write in what DOES matter to me. Measure S funding should not be used for any of what the City Council and developers have shoved through. Where is my choice to have "None of the Above"? Even a CEQA study includes the option of "No Project".

This survey is false and should be abandoned immediately.

Park and daily Farmers Market sounds good

I question whether any of the existing Library building can be repurposed in a cost-effective manner, but primarily believe the area currently occupied by the Library (and nearest City Hall) would make the best public open space/park. This seems the perfect location for the Farmers Market—in a new open space that's not a parking lot. Also feel that parking isn't necessary on-site.

Had to page through all the pre-answered questions to get to the point: We the people *don't* want this Measure S bait and switch. We do not need to build parking for Barry Sweson's Stack-and-packs, he can pay for his *own* parking garage. Just leave the library alone and refurb as needed.

My name is actually Legion.

The space is too far from Pacific to be a viable retail destination. It would serve the community much better as a Plaza or meeting space. Great spot for the Farmer's Market.

Regarding "affordable housing," I expect this means it's affordable to our seniors, very low wage earners, and those of us who work to support our community by working for government agencies, schools, etc. Also with priority being given to people who already reside in the community.

I like the concept of repurposing the existing building, but I'm not in favor of another surface parking lot. I would have ranked that option higher if the parking had been replaced with a plaza/event space. In any scenario, I don't think any portion of this space should be used as for surface parking.

I still favor renovating the current library where it is

I think the library should be refurbished where it stands and the farmers market should stay where it is. Instead of building a giant parking structure that benefits the few, we can take that money and invest it into public transit options that would support the many

Less parking and more parks, open space and affordable housing!

I'm not really in favor of any portion of the old library space becoming a public park or plaza. The City and County already seem to be stretched to the limit in their ability to maintain park space. There's not a park in the city limits where I would feel safe or comfortable spending time on my own.

Repurpose reuse recycle up cycle, keep it local, keep the old school SC vibe. Its why people come here and what we locals have always loved!

Prior to COVID, there was demand for office space for Tech jobs in Downtown Santa Cruz. Has anyone spoken to Looker, Amazon or other company for the need for office space to house higher paid jobs in our community? It's a great site for office development.

We need more affordable housing, not more parking, retail and dining!

The site use should match the City's most important need- affordable housing

No need to do anything until new library open which is about 24-36months away.

Please do not include any surface parking as it wastes valuable space. And please no dog park. Provide as much flexible open park space as possible for all uses such as farmers markets and events, as downtown Santa Cruz lacks a public gathering space. Including mixed use retail and housing around the space is a good idea as it provides "eyes on the street", and housing is much needed.

Because of the high cost of most downtown shops, this doesn't seem to be the best place for low income housing. Santa Cruz has very few public use spaces (Louden Nelson is nearly always booked up) and it would be nice to have more public use space available for rent. Downtown also lacks a park/plaza with greenspace so this also seems like a nice use.

We have been offered a very limited range of choices, and I'm not crazy about any of them. The whole "community commons" thing is simply not realistic. Any plaza or park that does not have regular programmed activities with active supervision and legal authority to regulate activities will become another problem area, making the city complex even more problematical for all kinds of civic and community functions and the surrounding area. The City already cannot adequately maintain and supervise its parks and public spaces. It seems crazy to create even more space in such a multi-use, important center of civic activity with a high likelihood of becoming a financial and social liability. I favor a medium density mixed use project -- city or community uses on the ground floor, housing above, with some parking provided (get real!) I favor the continued practice of street closures for scheduled permitted uses that ensure clear conditions of use -- Greek Festival, Cabrillo Festival and other civic-related functions, graduations, etc. It's essential to maintain circulation and access to the many key city functions in this immediate area, as well as the existing businesses and

institutions. Scale and intensity of activity should not compromise institutional and residential functions in the immediate area.

Affordable housing should have family sized units (2 bdrm) instead of all studio/1bdrm like has been proposed elsewhere. There should also be adequate off-street parking for those units and charging stations to encourage use of EVs.

Having attended a previous Zoom meeting on this topic, these 3 proposals do not accurately reflect the breakout group ideas. These 3 designs are too limited. What if we don't favor housing on the site at all? And there is no indication of possible height of a housing project there. And would housing really be compatible with the adjacent activities of a plaza, or would the residents complain about noise, etc? Lot 4 is the best lot for a permanent Farmers' Market and town plaza for activities during the rest of the week. If there is no money identified for actively programming a public space (plaza), it will not be a success. The library should be renovated where it is. You could put housing on top of a new library there if you must. That could satisfy a number of needs, while not obliterating Lot 4 with a massive building.

Because of the prime location I believe the largest number of local residents should benefit. That definitely rules out housing. Any re-use of the bldg should be community oriented, for the same reason.

I think the idea of a community gathering space will be great for farmers market, music, festivals, play!

For the first floor, I think government offices would work well for our tax base. Additionally, I believe we already have a 'city plaza' incorporated in the city building site across the street

I love baby and toddler time at libraries. Libraries are essential to my family. We need affordable housing in Santa Cruz so should be built as tall as possible.

Please build it as tall as possible. If you have to cross subsidize with market rate units to create the most amount of affordable units, please do.

I can envision a really beautiful plaza, with lots of greenery, trees, a park... maybe even a a splash pad style park for the kiddos mixed with local retail and housing. I also envision this gem being well maintained and closed up every night so this space stays in good shape for a long time.

The library building should be re used, but the parking lot should become the community plaza. Why build more parking if the new library structure is providing more parking as a multi story garage? Provide secure bike parking and MORE PUBLIC BATHROOMS, above all else! There is NO WHERE to go to the bathroom downtown which severely limits the amount of time normal people without bladders of steel can stay. Any new downtown development should include safe PUBLIC BATHROOMS!!!

Affordable housing should be a priority.

Public funds should not be used to pay for parking spaces. Especially downtown, our public buildings and affordable housing don't need on-site parking.

Please "repurpose" the existing library back into a remodeled library. Use measure s funds to do this.

This survey is terrible because it assumes we are on board with the city's plan to move the library and build a "mixed use" structure. When I voted yes on Measure S, I assumed my financial contribution would go towards rebuilding the library where it is. I feel like I have been hoodwinked.

My problem isn't inherently with building on that parking lot. I mean, I like the Farmers Market, but I am not attached to it being in that one location. My problem is with building a parking structure. We don't need any new parking structures. If you want to use that lot to build 100% affordable housing on top of a library, I would be fine with that. But a parking structure + still mostly market rate housing with some affordable units is not what our city needs.

So I chose the option to "re-purpose the Library" because I want you to use Measure S bond funds to renovate the existing Library with adjacent parking, following the basic approach of Jason Architecture.

Please use the Measure S funds to rebuild the present Library. DO NOT put a library in a parking structure on the site of the current farmers' Market.

Renovate the old library, don't build a new parking structure and put it inside of it. Put additional parking adjacent to the current library. This (new parking structure and library) is a waste of city funds, and you've wasted enough already.
